
Moderated questions were crafted after consulting with current and former trustees, parents, educators, journalists, and professors.

Shelby Joe is the President of General Academic, a tutoring, test prep, and consulting company in the Rice Village. In June, the HISD Board approved a \$2 billion budget for the 2017-18 school year. Staff and teachers received 2-4% salary increases, magnet funding remained unchanged, \$162m is earmarked for "Recapture," and the district is left with a \$106m deficit, which it is paying for from the rainy day fund.

Do you think that this is a good budget, and what would be your plan for reducing the shortfall to ensure that the district doesn't run out of cash as soon as next year?

In February, the districted eliminated the 30% weight of student performance criteria (testing) on teacher evaluations. However, the district is expected to adopt Texas state evaluations methods (T-TESS) for 2017—2018, which will likely include student standardized test results.

Texas Teacher Evaluation & Support System



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Melissa Marschall is Professor of Political Science and Director of the Center for Local Elections in American Politics The Texas Education Code requires school districts to provide every language minority student with the opportunity to participate in either a bilingual or English as a second language (ESL) program. Roughly 27% of HISD students participated in these programs in 2015-16. A recent report highlighted concerns about the academic performance of these students, specifically: the low performance STAAR End of Course assessments and a decline in the number of students who exited ELL status.

Do you believe that every school should have a certified librarian, counselor, nurse, and social worker provided for by HISD central office?



The average Bellaire / West U. family pays ~\$9k in property taxes to HISD annually but is not proportionally represented in the student body. They largely favor HISD magnet & neighborhood campuses only or choose to pay ~\$18k per year per child for private schools.
